Current Events Guidelines and Rubric

You are expected to print out and read a current event article from a newspaper, magazine or online site. Acceptable news sources: **CNN, Fox, AJC, Washington Post, New York Times, Time, Newsweek, US News and World Report**, etc. The article should be less than a week old and focuses on a **domestic issue** that correlates with a theme in US History (**Political, Social, Economics, Religious, Intellectual and/or Technological**). You are to summarize the article in your own words by addressing the “who, what, when, where and how/why” of the article. **(At least five, well-written and constructed sentences)**. You will also provide a commentary (your thoughts or reaction) for the article. Consider what makes the article important; why is it newsworthy; reason for selection; and how it might affect you, your community, your state, the U. S. and/or our world? **(At least five, well-written and constructed sentences)** You will also construct an analysis of your article. You will explain how your article relates to one of the above themes. You will then make **and** explain the connection to a significant event in U. S. History. **(At least five, well-written and constructed sentences. Your explanation must include similarities and differences.)** Lastly, you must ask and answer two “thought” provoking questions (**how, why, what if and/or agree/disagree**). At least 2 students will present each week. It is extremely important that you have your article preapproved prior to submission and presentation because you cannot present the same article as a fellow classmate. The paper **must be typed** and ready to hand in at the beginning of class on your designated day. **Staple the rubric on top followed by your typed response and then the article.** In addition, you will be expected to present and discuss the current event. It is very important that you fully understand the article in order to discuss it in class. Your verbal presentation should also address the further implications your current event has on the nation and possibly the world. Why is it significant news? Your presentation should generate insightful comments and discussion from your classmates. Practice your presentation so that you meet the 5 minute (**prior to Q & A**) requirement. **Reading verbatim from your submission is not the same as presenting and discussing your article with the class.** This assignment is a Project grade so it could weigh heavily on your overall grade. Ten percent will be deducted for each day that it is late. If you are absent on the day you are scheduled to present, the make-up policy applies. It is your responsibility to schedule a time to present. Failure to do so within the policy time frame, will activate the late policy deductions.

Guidelines:

1. Article must be annotated and at least 500 words (Current and approximately 2 pages printed with URL and/or source, day and time visible on print out)
2. **Typed Summary is at least 4 paragraphs** (1-Summary, 2-Commentary, 3- Theme/Connection to Past Event, 4-Q1 and Answer and Q2 and Answer) Each paragraph should have a minimum of 5 well-constructed sentences.

Non-Verbal Skills				
Eye Contact	Holds attention of entire audience with the use of direct eye contact, seldom looking at notes.	Consistent use of direct eye contact with audience, but still returns to notes. Deductions:

- Working on assignments/technology while fellow classmates are presenting-1pt each infraction
- Disruptive behavior during fellow classmates' presentations-2pts each infraction
- Grammar/Mechanics, not typed, no rubric-1pt each infraction
- Failure to meet minimum speaking time before Q/A-2pts from presentations grade
- Failure to meet minimum paragraph structure-5pts for each infraction
